

Lenten Journey

"For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." - Jeremiah 29:11

So how is your Lenten Journey coming along? Is it as planned? Were you able to give up everything you had hoped to give up? Have you taken on an unexpected journey this Lenten season? Then she heard a loud "quack, quack" and the mother mallard duck issued a warning to back away from the unexpected nest. The nest was not expected because Susan lives in midtown Memphis and no where near a pond or lake. Susan is delighted with the antics of her new neighbor and the hope for new life right there in the flower bed under the window.

New life and hope come in unexpected moments and in unexpected ways. Someone once said "life is what happens while we are making other plans". That might be true, but one thing is certain, our plans cannot compare to the plans our Lord makes which give us a future with hope.
